Giant Trouble: The Mystery of the Magic Beans Discussion Questions for REACH Partners

from author Laurel Decher & REACH editor Donna Boock

- 1. William uses his comic strips to defend a friend, clear up a misunderstanding, and speak up for someone. Discuss with your reading buddy: Have either of you used a skill or talent to help someone else? How did it go? What happened?
- 2. Have you ever moved to a new school or community? What was hard for you? What helped you feel at home? Do you have helpful tips for someone your age?
- 3. Do you have a recipe for making friends? Brainstorm ways to make someone new feel at home.
- 4. There are so many kinds of beans in the world. Does your family like beans? What's your favorite kind? Do you have a family recipe or one that you would like to learn?
- 5. William and his friends have to work together to solve a mystery. Can you think of a time when teamwork helped you accomplish something? What made working together easier?

Discussion Questions for Classroom Teachers & Librarians

- 1. Using art and story can be a powerful way to make the world a better place. Is there something important you want everyone to understand? Design a t-shirt (or several) or a comic strip airplane and get the word out.
- 2. Throughout the book, William and his friends face misunderstandings that they must clear up. Why do misunderstandings happen? What are some good ways to solve them?
- 3. Mr. Giant is different from everyone else in the story, and some people are afraid of him at first. Have you ever had an experience where you judged someone before getting to know them? How can we make sure we include and welcome others?
- 4. Magic beans are at the center of this mystery. If you had a magic bean that could do anything, what power would it have? How would you use it?
- 5. Fairy tales often have messages or lessons. What do you think is the most important lesson from Giant Trouble? How does it connect to real life?


In Giant Trouble: The Mystery of the Magic Beans, William folds his comic strips into paper airplanes to spread his message on the battlefield.


Draw a comic, fill in your title and byline, and add your name and the year to the copyright line.

Magic 📴 🦾 💦 Trail Mix

A fun, customizable snack mix that looks like a collection of magical beans!

Ingredients:

- Jelly beans (magic beans!)
- Chocolate-covered nuts (for strength)
- Yogurt-covered raisins (for wisdom)
- Dried fruit (for speed)
- Popcorn (for lightness—so you don't fall from a beanstalk!)
- Mini pretzels (for twists and turns in the adventure!)

Instructions:

- 1. Set out all the ingredients in bowls.
- 2. Let kids scoop and mix their own magic bean trail mix.
- 3.As they create, encourage them to assign "powers" to different beans (e.g., red = strength, yellow = invisibility).
- 4. Enjoy while reading Giant Trouble!
